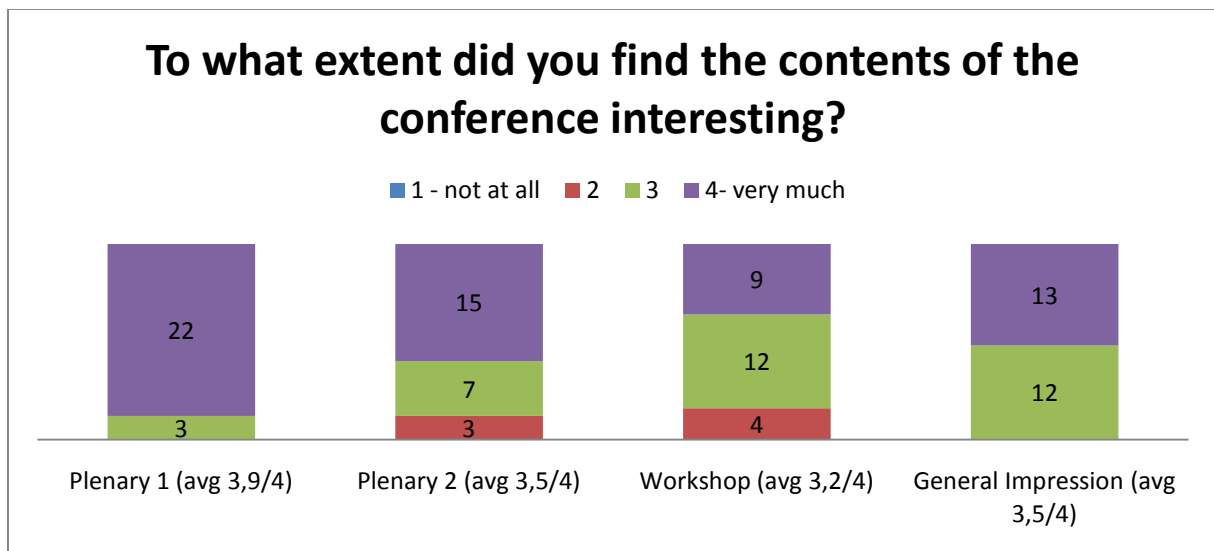


Evaluation of the Mentoring Conference, April 27 2010



25 out of 50 participants filled out the conference evaluation, which was placed out in the folders given to all participants. By the respondents, the conference got very high ratings. The general impression of the conference is very good; all participants rated the conference 3 or 4 out of 4. The general comments about the conference are very positive. Many express that the conference has helped them to further develop their work with the Nightingale. Also, the organization of the conference is lifted:

Interesting and inspiring, will help us being better

Good organization, generous people sharing experiences. Thank you!

The first plenary session by Mr. Amos Carmelli got an average rating of 3,9 out of 4, and the second plenary session about the Nightingale was rated 3,5 out of 4. The comments from the participants are very positive. Several are pointing out that Amos's session inspired them and that it was fruitful to hear the experiences from the Nightingale Malmö:

New contacts, interesting plenary sessions

Inspiring but rather long. Nice to hear Amos

Enlightening

Might have been more concrete, but Martin's contribution was especially interesting, concrete and clear

The workshop also got good ratings with an average of 3,2 out of 4. All workshops had about the same average rating (Workshop 1: 3,0; Workshop 2: 3,4; Workshop 3: 3,0). However, the comments are also telling us that there should be more time for the workshops:

Good - broad perspective - very educational

Interesting to participate

Too short presentations. Questions would have been allowed after each presentation instead of after all

Not enough time!

Just one person is critical to the conference in general. He/she believes that the conference was fairly expensive and that focus was on the good things about mentoring and not on any issues or problems. However, this comment captures the essence of all participants:

Good to see so many project leaders and coordinators who take this to the top of the society for the children who need it
